The Lower Volga Village Project consists of a cluster of nine colonies in the Volga area which were established between 1764 and 1766. The colonies were all of Germans of the Lutheran faith, and were established by the Russian government on the west side of the Volga River, at the far south end of the Volga villages.

The Lower Volga villages are Dobrinka, Dubovka, Dreispitz, Galka, Holstein, Kraft, Mueller, Shcherbakovka, Schwab and Stephan.

### ELUSIVE CATHOLIC VOLGA GERMAN CHURCH RECORDS FOUND IN SALT LAKE CITY COLLECTIONS

Mr. William Pickelhaupt reported discovering 30 Catholic parish registries for the years following the 1875 exodus to the USA and the years before World War I. Many researchers thought these records were unavailable or did not exist.

Mr. Pickelhaupt notes,

"I just found notes from my trip to Salt Lake City in March, and wanted to mention some parish registers that were discovered on microfilm roll number 2376721. The title boards and indexing by LDS originally said they were revision lists, but they were mislabeled. These are all supposed to be Roman Catholic parishes, except one for a Baptist parish."

The parishes included Herzog, Liebenthal, Obermonjou, Pfeifer, Mariental, Seelman, Katherinastadt, Schoenchen and others.

The local AHSGR chapter has taken steps to purchase this LDS microfilm through a local library.

## COPYRIGHT LAWS

In this country, any "original" documents older than 1926 are public domain. In this country, original documents and publications created with tax dollars (government created documents) have no copyright, and are public domain. Additionally, documents from foreign countries that were created before 1926, and brought to this country, are public domain. Fair use doesn't even apply to public domain documents, books, etc.

Copyright does apply to translation of public domain documents which are put together in a book or document. The length of the copyright depends on when the publication was created. It can be as long as 100 years, or much more.

“From their web site, it would appear that Engles is threatening to sue anyone who publishes material from their archive without permission.

It would make for an interesting court case. Archive material, basically stolen from the Volga German people, is being sold back to Volga Germans for the cost of \$11 per page, with the proviso that you can't publish it without their permission.

The availability of Church records is due to the illegal closure and repression of both Lutheran and Catholic Churches...what a interesting case it would make!

Archival laws for Russia clearly state that the local archives decides policy on the amount of material made available and the cost, hence you have both Volgograd and Samara archives allowing complete copying of files, for reasonable prices.

The prices are ridiculous. When Volga Germans in the West graciously donated money for the restoration of various archival collections, who would have thought that the availability of those same collections would be priced out of reach for most people?”

## World War II Volga German Veterans

We received a request to develop some stories of this vanishing group of honored kinsmen and women. In that spirit I am writing of Irv Jacobs who in the service of General Patton, entered Germany under arms, not that distant from where his ancestors left for Russia centuries earlier.

Irv Jacobs, of Hays, Kansas, a descendant of Pfeifer, Russia settlers, was born in 1923. He finished High School as an officer at St. Joseph Military Academy in Hays, KS at the dawn of World War II. The US Army gave him a commission as a Second Lieutenant in the infantry, a status that landed him at Normandy on the first day of that great invasion.

Some “genius” in military intelligence (?) thought that fluency in German might be useful on that first night for detecting German infiltration in the American ranks. The duties were not clearly defined and Irv related that it damn near got him killed the first night “butting around” trying to figure what was going on.

Irv lead a company across France in General Patton’s Third Army and found himself on the banks of the Rhine River in March 1945.

Irv related how when Patton showed up, he scared the hell out of them, for he surely had some dire task for his men to perform.

Such was the case on March 22, 1945 when his unit was to be the first unit to invade across the Rhine River into Germany.

“At 9:45 PM men of two assault companies of the 5<sup>th</sup> Infantry started walking quietly toward the Rhine 700 yards north of Oppenheim. Engineers had heavy assault boats assembled for the crossing. “Lt. Irv Jacobs, leader of K Company, scrambled silently into a boat. Up and down the bank, assault teams were quietly getting into other craft and shoving off. The splash of oars seemed to carry for miles - most certainly to the alert Germans only 800 feet away on the far shore. Lt. Jacobs, in the lead boat, looked cautiously over the front ramp. He could detect the dim outline of the bank only 100 feet away.

Along with each man in the assault, the lieutenant expected to be raked

with machine-gun fire at any moment. But not a shot was fired. Instead he felt the gentle crunch of his craft on the shore. K Company men scrambled out of their boats and moved inland. Moments later seven startled Germans emerged from the darkness with their hands in the air.”

Several hundred yards south of Oppenheim, another assault company met with heavy resistance. However soon 15,000 foot soldiers and 71 tanks were across to the German shore. (1)

On March 24, 1945 General Montgomery was due to launch Operation Plunder, the massive northern offensive that originally been intended to lead the way across the Rhine.

On March 23, 1945 General Bradley received a phone call from his subordinate, General Patton. “Brad, don’t tell anyone but I’m across”, he said. “Well I’ll be damned. You mean across the Rhine?” “Sure am. I sneaked a division over last night. But there are so few Krauts around here they don’t know it yet. So don’t make any announcement – we’ll keep it a secret until we see how it goes”. But the temptation to upstage Montgomery on the eve of his long-awaited offensive quickly irresistible. Patton placed a second call: “Brad, for God’s sake, tell the world we’re across.... I want the world to know Third Army made it before Monty.”

An hour or so later, Bradley’s headquarters announced that elements of the Third Army had crossed the river and had done so “without benefit of aerial bombing, ground smoke, artillery preparation, and airborne assistance.” The following day Patton stalked onto a pontoon bridge and started toward the opposite shore. Halfway across he stopped. He’d always wanted to “piss in the Rhine,” he said – and in full view of his men he did. (2)
